Introduction



STUDENTS WHO HAVE STUDIED ABROAD OFTEN IDENTIFY THE EXPERIENCE AS ONE OF THE MOST MEANINGFUL IN THEIR COLLEGE CAREER, OR EVEN LIFETIME. It can be challenging, however, to convey the significance and impact of the experience to someone who did not share it with you. This can be challenging in everyday conversations with peers and relatives, but even more so within the context of the pursuit of professional or academic goals. This handbook will guide you through the process of identifying and communicating how your study abroad experience has equipped you to contribute unique value to a potential employer or academic program.

Reflect on Your Experience



REFLECTING ON YOUR EXPERIENCE ABROAD WILL HELP YOU CRAFT NARRATIVES THAT CAN BE ADAPTED FOR USE IN NETWORKING CONVERSATIONS, INTERVIEWS, COVER LETTERS, AND ADMISSION ESSAYS. While

abroad, you encountered many situations which required you to adapt and step outside of your comfort zone. These experiences may have led to increased self-efficacy and resilience to overcome challenges and approach unfamiliar situations. It is important to reflect upon these experiences appropriately so they can be evaluated, applied, and conveyed effectively in various contexts when interacting with employers.

Here are some examples on how to connect your experience abroad to skills or qualities valued in the workplace.

REFLECT ON YOUR EXPERIENCE

THE STAR METHOD

The STAR method is a communication technique that can help you provide complete and meaningful answers to behavior focused questions. This powerful personal development tool can help you engage in selfreflection. When people reflect, they are more aware of what motivates them and this helps them develop and grow.

Let's take a look at an example on how to craft a thoughtful response to the prompt *"Tell me about your experience studying abroad."* Even in an informal, social situation you can connect and engage on a deeper level if you avoid surface-level responses such as "it was amazing" or vague references to the things you miss about the country (food, culture, people). Engage the listener in a story that enables them to grasp the complexity of your experience and the nuanced skills and perspectives it instilled in you.

START WITH THE TAKEAWAY:

[One sentence on how your experience abroad impacted or changed you]

Study abroad was a life changing experience that helped me define my career plans for the future.

SITUATION:

[Provide contextual information about the program: what, when, where, why, with whom]

I studied abroad in 2021 at the University of Cambridge, England, in a faculty-led program with other UCLA students. Our program focused on Political Science and Art.

TASK:

[Share a challenge or opportunity you faced]

On the first day of my program, I got lost on the subway and had forgotten my phone at my dorm.

ACTION:

[Describe how you responded to the challenge or opportunity]

I had to find my way back by talking to locals and being resourceful.

RESULT:

[Share how you have grown or changed as a result of the experience and how you hope to apply your skills and knowledge to your academic or professional pursuits.]

I am less reliant on technology and more confident in asking for help when needed. This situation allowed me to develop my problem-solving skills, which is an important skill for the workforce or grad school.

When preparing your job search materials or for an interview, be prepared to share specific examples that demonstrate your abilities.

Top skills employers seek and value from students with international experiences:

- Interaction with people who hold different interests, values, or perspectives
- Understanding cultural differences in the workplace
- Ability to plan, organize, and prioritize work
- Adapting to situations of change
- Gaining new knowledge from experiences
- Ability to work independently
- Undertaking tasks that are unfamiliar/risky
- Applying information in new or broader contexts
- Identifying new problems and their solutions
- Working effectively with co-workers



NACE CAREER READINESS COMPETENCIES

The following competencies have been identified through research conducted by the National Association of Colleges and Employers (NACE) as broadly preparing the college educated for success in the workplace and lifelong career management. Listed within each competency are sample behaviors that you may have developed throughout the course of your experience abroad.







Career and Self-Development

- Identify areas for continual growth while pursuing and applying feedback.
- Develop plans and goals for one's future career.
- Display curiosity; seek out opportunities to learn.
- Establish, maintain, and/or leverage relationships with people who can help one professionally.
- Seek and embrace development opportunities.
- Voluntarily participate in further education, training, or other events to support one's career

Communication

- Demonstrate verbal, written, and non-verbal/body language abilities.
- Communicate in a clear and organized manner so that others can effectively understand.
- Frame communication with respect to diversity of learning styles, varied individual communication abilities, and cultural differences.
- Ask appropriate questions for specific information.
- Promptly inform relevant others when needing guidance.

Critical Thinking

- Make decisions and solve problems using sound, inclusive reasoning and judgment.
- Gather and analyze information from a diverse set of sources and individuals to fully understand a problem.
- Effectively communicate actions and rationale, recognizing the diverse perspectives and lived experiences of stakeholders.
- Multi-task well in a fast-paced environment.

Equity & Inclusion

- Seek global cross-cultural interactions and experiences that enhance one's understanding of people from different demographic groups and that leads to personal growth.
- Keep an open mind to diverse ideas and new ways of thinking.

Leadership

- Use innovative thinking to go beyond traditional methods.
- Serve as a role model to others by approaching tasks with confidence and a positive attitude.
- Motivate and inspire others by encouraging them and by building mutual trust.

- Consistently meet or exceed goals and expectations.
- Show a high level of dedication toward doing a good job.

Teamwork

- Listen carefully to others, taking time to understand and ask appropriate questions without interrupting.

- Be accountable for individual and team responsibilities and deliverables.
- Exercise the ability to compromise and be agile.
- Collaborate with others to achieve common goals.

- Quickly adapt to new or unfamiliar technologies.

GLOBAL COMPETENCE EQUIPS INDIVIDUALS TO MOVE FROM LEARNING ABOUT THE WORLD TO MAKING

A DIFFERENCE IN IT. It is the key to becoming local and global problem solvers, to thrive in a more diverse, interconnected world, and fully engage in issues of global significance. In this globalization era, people with global competency are more attractive and valuable to employers.

Global competence is comprised of the following dimensions: knowledge, skills, values, attitudes

KNOWLEDGE:

Understanding of global/ intercultural issues and appreciation for diverse perspectives.

SKILLS:

Thinking critically, observing, and analyzing issues. Taking action to make an impact on society.

VALUES & ATTITUDES:

Understanding and appreciating diverse perspectives. Communicating and interacting appropriately across cultures, while remaining open to continuous learning.

The world of work demands effective communication, openness, appreciation for diversity, and respect for others. Understanding the world through a global lens will help you stand out as a well-rounded candidate in the job market. To do this, you'll need to translate your experiences into tangible skills and articulate them to the employer.

GLOBAL COMPETENCE

To demonstrate global competence, you'll need to convey the following skills to the employer:

- Appreciation and respect of diverse cultural perspectives and norms, such as being open minded, non-judgmental, and accepting of differences.
- Experience of multicultural environments either abroad or in one's own country.
- Adaptability and flexibility in unfamiliar situations.
- International awareness, knowledge, and understanding.

Let's identify each Global Competency and the study abroad experiences that helped develop them.

Knowledge	Understanding issues of global significance	While studying abroad in Vietnam, I learned about industrialization and economic growth in developing countries. I was surprised to hear that many young people work in poor conditions in factories for up to ten hours a day, instead of going to school. I decided to go online to learn more about manufacturing standards and policies and discovered that some clothing brands are more concerned with human rights in their factories than others. I am now an advocate for ethically responsible manufacturing.
Skills	Resiliency in new situations	While staying with a host family in Morocco, I learned very quickly the importance of being aware of social customs. In Morocco, you only take food from shared dishes with your right hand as the left is reserved for bathroom and cleaning duties. Fortunately, my host-family explained this before I made a cultural faux pas (mistake).
Values & Attitudes	Valuing multiple perspectives	During my study abroad program in the Middle East, I met with many locals and officials from difference countries. I kept an open mind and respected the perspectives of everyone I met with.

Communicate Your Value



NOW THAT YOU'VE IDENTIFIED YOUR COMPETENCIES AND HOW YOU'VE DEVELOPED THEM, YOU CAN PRACTICE ARTICULATING THEM TO AN EMPLOYER. In this section, you will learn specific strategies to help you integrate your study abroad experience into your resume, cover letter, interviews, and networking conversations. **The purpose of a resume is to get you an interview**, help you prepare for an interview, and build your confidence. This section will focus on ways you may consider showcasing your study abroad experiences on your resume.

GENERAL TIPS FOR RESUMES

Formatting

- Standard/legible font
- 10-12 size font
- Make sure your name stands out
- Use a professional email address
- Use bullet points No complete sentences or paragraphs
- Stay consistent on format
- Keep it to one page

Content

- Education
- Experience
- Leadership/Involvement
- Extracurricular Activities
- Skills
- Certifications

Action Statements

- Quantify your achievements
- Highlight transferrable skills
- 3-5 bullets per position
- Each bullet should state what you do and how you do it
- Each bullet should begin with an action verb to indicate what skill you used
- Sample action verbs: Monitored, answered, served, collaborated, presented, facilitated, organized
- Ex: Monitored inventory on a weekly basis by counting and recording data using excel data sheet
- Ex: Organized activities and events for 30 student club members on a monthly basis

Tailoring Your Resume

- Ensure that the content of your resume is directly aligned with the job that you are applying for
- Use keywords from the job description
- Generic resumes do not get interviews
- Employers sense when a resume is generic and assume that you do not care enough about the job to spend time tailoring your resume

RESUME TIPS FOR STUDY ABROAD EXPERIENCE

- Make sure the study abroad experience is stated in the Education section
- Beyond the Education section, you can include study abroad throughout your resume as appropriate and relevant to the job you're applying to. For example, if you were involved in a research project while abroad and it is relevant to the job you're applying to, you can include the research project within your resume. If you did an internship or community service while abroad, you could include that throughout your experiences on the resume. (See sample on the next page.)
- Describe your experiences in bullet-point format, using action verbs to highlight the transferrable skills.

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The goal of the cover letter is to help support your resume and experience. This is your opportunity to share what sets you apart from other candidates while pitching your skills, qualifications, experiences and knowledge of the company and the contribution you can make.

GENERAL TIPS FOR COVER LETTERS

Formatting

- Format like a letter, including employer address and contact information at the top
- Address to a specific person/hiring manager if you can find their name
- Use the same header as your resume
- Keep to one page
- Include a salutation and signature

Content

- Include an introduction stating the position you're applying to and how you learned about the position
- Provide a summary of your relevant skills and experiences
- Connect your past experiences to the job and company
- State the mission of the company and how it relates to your goals
- Share your passion and interest in the field
- Push for an interview
- Make sure it's tailored to a specific position

COVER LETTER TIPS FOR STUDY ABROAD EXPERIENCE

- Describe your global competencies knowledge, skills, values, and attitudes. Provide examples of your experiences and how you used those competencies
- Connect your global competencies to the job. Explain how your international experience can uniquely contribute to your role at the organization
- Market your transferable skills such as independence, cultural sensitivity, confidence, and problem-solving skills to the employer to help you stand out from the other candidates more uniquely.
- Make sure your cover letter is future oriented. Relate your experiences to the company and how you can contribute to their mission, vision, clients, and overall purpose.

My skill set enables me to provide perspective and international models of other educational systems that would benefit your research to improve the ESL curriculum of the English Camp for next summer.

There are many types of Interviews: one-on-one, panel, group, presentation, etc. Regardless of which type of interview you're asked to do, there are general tips that apply to all interviews.

GENERAL TIPS FOR INTERVIEWS

- Do your research before the interview to make sure you know about company's goals
- Practice for general interview questions
- Know how the position applies to your skills and interests and think of how you can demonstrate that
- Identify questions you want to ask the employer
- Dress for success
- Use the CARR Method below to identify examples from your past experiences and answer behavioral interview questions



THE CARR METHOD

Behavioral interview questions aim to assess a particular skill or quality through an example of how you handled a situation in the past. The idea is that past behavior indicates future performance. Behavioral questions typically start with "Tell me about a time when..." or "Give an example of when you..."

CONTEXT:

Describe a specific event/situation from your past. Provide context so that the interviewer understands the situation but avoid unnecessary details. Use examples from past jobs, school, or community experiences

ACTION:

Describe the action that you took to address the situation. Focus on your role, what you thought and how you handled the situation

RESULT:

What was the result of your action? What did you accomplish? What did you learn?

RELATE:

How does this experience relate to the position you're applying to?

INTERVIEW EXAMPLE 1:

Describe a time when you encountered a communication barrier while studying abroad and how did you handle it?

CONTEXT:

While studying abroad in Spain, I was living with a host family. On my first day I realized that I didn't have a pillowcase on my pillow. I did not know the word, but it was late and I didn't have time to look it up before my Señora went to bed.

ACTION:

I thought about different options. I could either sleep without a pillow that night or think of another way to ask for what I needed. I decided to get creative and asked her for a "t-shirt" for the pillow.

RESULT:

This actually became a nice icebreaker. We laughed about the situation and she was able to teach me the correct word and get me what I needed.

RELATE:

In this experience, I used creativity to help me communicate my needs. I've learned that it's important to communicate my needs and adapt my approach to each situation, which is a valuable skillset that I can translate to other situations.

THE CARR METHOD

INTERVIEW EXAMPLE 2:

What experience do you have working with people from backgrounds different from your own, and how do you think this experience relates to the workplace?

CONTEXT:

During the summer of my 3rd year at UCLA, I conducted an 8-week internship in Bogota, Colombia. For my internship, I was placed at an organization that works with adolescents and LGBTI youth who are victims of domestic violence. As a non-native Spanish speaker and first time visitor to Colombia, I had to learn how to navigate my workplace in a second language and a new culture, while also serving a diverse group of clientele. In the beginning, due to the language barrier, I often found myself getting frustrated when I couldn't get my point across or when I didn't fully understand instructions provided to me by my colleagues. I also realized that the approach the organization goes about supporting their clientele in Colombia is much different than how I have been accustomed to at similar organizations in Los Angeles.

ACTION:

Although challenging in the beginning, I was eventually able to adapt and become a strong contributor to my office place. Rather than getting frustrated, I worked hard to be patient when speaking in Spanish and made sure to ask clarifying questions if I didn't understand something from one of my fellow colleagues. Over time, I began to understand why the organization took a different approach to serving their clientele, much of which was based on local laws, stigma and support systems. Instead of viewing the "U.S. approach" as better, just because that was what I was used to, I began to see and understand the benefits of the way my internship site served their clientele in the local context of the Colombian culture.

RESULT:

By the end of the 8-week internship, I went from being an outsider assisting with small supportive tasks, to being a full blown contributing member of the team. I was able to value the opinions and viewpoints of the other team members, while also providing ideas based on my own experiences working in similar organizations in Los Angeles. Towards the end of my internship, I was even tasked with leading a new initiative focused on creating resources for local primary school teachers, who may believe that their students have been victims of domestic violence.

RELATE:

This experience taught me a lot about working with people from different backgrounds. I realize that most office spaces are global and include people from various backgrounds. This experience has definitely improved my intercultural fluency and has taught me to be more adaptable, patient, and open-minded, so that I can thrive while working with a diverse group of co-workers.

INTERVIEWS

INTERVIEW TIPS FOR STUDY ABROAD EXPERIENCE

- Integrate your study abroad experiences into your answers throughout the interview. Don't wait until the employer specifically asks about study abroad/ global competence.
- Describe how you can contribute to the company by highlighting the specific skills you developed while studying abroad.
- Clearly state specific examples from your study abroad experience and what skills you gained from each given situation as they relate to the job.
- Be prepared to highlight examples from study abroad that demonstrate diversity, problemsolving, openness to learning, risk-taking, foreign language, etc.

COMMON INTERVIEW QUESTIONS

- 1. Tell us about yourself.
- 2. What is your understanding of the position and why are you interested in it?
- 3. How have your past experiences prepared you for this position?
- 4. How does this position align with your long-term and short-term career goals?
- 5. What do you know about our company, our products, and our mission statement?
- 6. In what significant ways can you contribute to our organization?
- 7. What are your greatest strengths and weaknesses?
- 8. Tell us about a time when...
- 9. Describe an example of when you showed...
- 10. Tell us about one of your greatest accomplishments.

Expand Your Network



NETWORKING IS A VITAL SKILL IN YOUR CAREER JOURNEY. WHETHER YOU SEEK EMPLOYMENT IN THE STATES OR ABROAD, NETWORKING IS THE KEY THAT WILL MAKE THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN YOU AND ANOTHER CANDIDATE. With the various social media platforms available in modern society, networking has become easier than ever. You can leverage your social media platforms to develop your personal brand, connect with professionals, and remain relevant in your industry. As a study abroad returnee, you can stay in contact with people from your host country, which will significantly broaden your network! As a result of being abroad, you have expanded your network tremendously by meeting new faculty, peers and possibly even employers and co-workers. That puts you at a huge advantage over the competition so optimizing your network is key in your career trajectory.

EXPAND YOUR NETWORK

Here are some tips to help you grow and maintain a global network:



Professionalism and Awareness

How you portray yourself on social media matters. Even on your personal profiles, it is important to be mindful of the message and branding you are putting across. Keep in mind that employers can access your social media during the job search process. Furthermore, while you are studying abroad, you may be sharing your experience on your social platforms. Make sure to highlight the quality of your experiences and indicate what you're learning via your posts. It is also a good idea to add study abroad to your Handshake and LinkedIn profiles as this demonstrates that you've engaged in diverse experiences and went out of your comfort zone to grow and develop.



Elevator Pitch

Developing your elevator pitch is the first step in networking and building your personal brand. A good elevator pitch should be short and memorable.

Introduce yourself + your value proposition + the ask

SAMPLE PITCH: Hello, my name is Ellis Bruin. I am a UCLA student majoring in psychology and Education minor. I just returned from a summer abroad in Italy where I studied intrinsic and extrinsic motivation and how it affects student learning. I am aspiring to become a global educational consultant helping families in identifying ideal international schools for their children when moving abroad for work. It is a pleasure to meet you.

Informational Interviews

An informational interview is a conversation with a professional in a career field you are considering, which will help you gather information and advice to assist in your career planning process. Informational interviews are a great way to learn from professionals and grow your network.

Social media platforms, especially LinkedIn, are a great way to connect with professionals. You can also use <u>UCLAOne</u> to connect specifically with UCLA alumni.

To request an informational interview, you can send a written request via email or message on a social media platform. Your message includes your elevator pitch and serves as a preliminary introduction to help communicate the intent of your request—to gather information and advice about a career option (not to ask for a job). Remember, this is their first impression of you. Be formal and professional in your correspondence.

SAMPLE MESSAGE:

I am a psychology student at UCLA with experience in research and tutoring, and with interest in intrinsic and extrinsic motivation. I am aspiring to become an educational consultant for global markets and I was hoping to hear about your career journey in this field. I appreciate your consideration and look forward to meeting you.

Kind Regards, Student name

Don't forget to send a "Thank You" note after the meeting and what you got out of the interaction. It's important to show your gratitude and professionalism.

Maintaining Connection Globally

While studying abroad, you can contact professionals in your industry via social media, specifically LinkedIn, to introduce yourself and create a connection.

Take note of the people you met while abroad. These can include anyone from professors, peers, roommates, employers, coworkers or people you met in your extracurricular activities. Make a list of these individuals and how you met them. Add them to your LinkedIn account and reach out to them for an update from time to time.

You can also request a recommendation from faculty and/or employers if you think they can add value to your profile. Choose people that have witnessed your knowledge, leadership, tenacity, and hard work and can attest to the contribution you can make to a potential employer/role.

Remember that your online presence impacts your professional image. Continue to be mindful about your posts as you build and maintain your global network.

In conclusion, keep in touch with your network, be active on LinkedIn and share relevant articles, wins, accomplishments to keep your profile active and thriving. Request and provide recommendations to keep your profile up to date and thriving. Optimize your network and live your Brand. Remember, your brand is your name so make it impeccable by the reputation you build for yourself.
